ID Card Update

The latest word from DFAS is that the old legacy paper-based ID cards will not all expire on 31 Dec, as was previously, apparently erroneously, reported. They will "remain valid until DoD determines when those ... cards will be terminated." Then "the Department intends to execute a positive communications plan formally announcing the termination well in advance of the actual termination date." Meanwhile, those individuals who still retain a legacy ID card should make sure that their contact information is up to date in DEERS, and they "may replace those legacy ID cards with a Next Generation USID card" at their convenience either online or at their nearest ID card office (for us, probably Waller Hall, JBLM).

With our warm summer weather it is hard to believe it is time to start thinking about Santa's Castle, but it really is never too early to welcome the spirit of Christmas giving. September through November is our quarter for contributions to the castle.

The mission of Santa's Castle is to ease holiday stress by providing new toys, board games and books to military families in the Pacific Northwest who are experiencing financial hardships. Last season they served 1,913 families with 4,040 children, distributing \$791,928 worth of toys, books, games, bikes and stocking

stuffers to make Christmas brighter for our Service Members and their families. Santa's Castle Open House was Thursday, September 25, 1100-1800 at 2094 Bitar Ave, Lewis Main, JBLM. The place was already humming with excitement as they welcomed visitors and talked about preparations for what promises to be another very busy season. Our donation goal this year is \$2000.

Along with collecting monetary donations, we will run a sports ball drive again this year for Santa's Castle and it is not too early to start buying new sports balls for this drive. You can bring them to meetings and hand them over to chapter officers to collect or wait and bring them to the Sports Ball Drop in November, date and time TBD. Talk to your family, your friends, the other service groups you belong to and encourage them all to support our sports ball drive this year!

United Way Day of Caring 2025 - by Ro Marcus

United Way of Thurston County's Day of Caring is its largest volunteer event of the year—bringing together individuals, businesses, and organizations to make a hands-on difference. From landscaping and painting to harvesting gardens and providing needed services, we can continue to serve, build community, and show what it means to LIVE UNITED.

The chapter has participated in this event in the past. In 2019, our chapter helped Nature Nurtures Farm get ready for winter. In 2024, we helped clean up a nature preserve.

This year, Day of Caring was Friday, September 26, 2025, and once again our chapter participated,

helping the South Sound Reading Foundation with tasks related to donated books; checking condition of the books, cleaning them as needed and placing stickers on books prior to placing them back into circulation.



The Foundation, founded in 2001, envisions a community where all children read well and enjoy reading, and where reading opens new opportunities. To that end, it has a book van that visits sites and delivers books, has 3 locations where "bags o' books" can be picked up, has story time and other literacy programs as well as programs to educate families about reading. On average, the Foundation distributes 80,000 books each year, serving over 1500 children each week, of which 85% are from low-income families. This is a great organization to help. The two hours flew by as we sat around the table working, chatting, snapping photos. United Way passed out T-shirts and buttons and the SSRF



even provided snacks. It sure felt good to do good!

Shelton Veterans Village by Roselyn (Ro) Marcus

New Horizon Communities manages several tiny home villages, two of which are for veterans. The Shelton Veterans Village (Village) in Shelton opened in 2023 and houses 30 veterans, both men and women. In addition to providing housing stability, the Village provides case management, behavioral health individual and group therapy sessions, community meals and other services.

In July, Bill Moseley, David (Slots) Slotwinski and myself visited the Village and toured the facilities with the manager, Dave Redman. We toured the main building, a vacant tiny home and the grounds, which include a vegetable and fruit garden that the residents maintain. What we saw was a well-run community that offers services and hope to our homeless veterans.

The Village is always in need of donations, both monetary and in-kind. One thing we saw was that the village maintains a small library for their residents, who are avid readers. The library could use an infusion of books. We saw novels of all genre, from mysteries and spy thrillers to historical fiction and stories of families or friendship.

I proposed and the Olympia Area MOAA Chapter board agreed to invite our chapter to help provide books for its library. Thank you to everyone who has already provided book donations. I will continue to collect books from chapter members in the coming months, just contact me (

) if you have books to donate. I plan to make a first delivery of books in mid-October. We are hoping to deliver books to the Village in time for the holiday season. It would make a great holiday gift from our chapter to their community.

The Major Richard Star Act was proposed as an amendment in both the House and the Senate to their versions of the 2026 NDAA. It appears to have ample support in both chambers, if it can get to the floor for a vote. As of the writing of this article the House had passed their version of the NDAA, but the Senate had not. WE still need to make our support for this act, as well as other important military family legislative matters, heard.

Nez, Chester, Code Talker: The First and Only Memoir By One of the Original Navajo Code Talkers of WWII. During World War II, the Japanese had managed to crack every code the United States used. But when the Marines turned to their Navaio recruits to develop and implement a secret military language, they created the only unbroken code in modern warfare - and helped assure victory for the United States over Japan in the South Pacific – based on a language they were punished for speaking while attending boarding schools that sought to rid them of their culture and traditions as children torn from their families by the government of the country they would grow up to fight to protect. The Navajo have always been warriors and their upbringing on southwestern reservations gave them the physical and mental strength to excel as Marines. Sounds like a great read! From Amazon
